ANZAC DAY

The image above shows the Malaya-Borneo contingent in the 2026 Adelaide Anzac March, led by our Vice-President, Confrontation veteran Don Cameron. We honoured those who served and lost their lives on active service during the undeclared Malayan wars and regional conflicts which immediately followed World War 2.

Don served in three battalions of the Royal Australian Regiment between 1962 and 1968 – at Terendak Garrison on the Malay Peninsula, on the Thai-Malay Border, and on Borneo at the rifle company defensive position 'Bukit Knuckle' near Kampung Gumbang in Sarawak.

Don was a founding member of the SA Branch in 1995, and served as Treasurer for a total of ten years. He has been Vice-President since the reformation of the SA/NT Branch in 2010, and was Interim President of the SA/NT Branch in 2022.

MEMORIES OF ANZAC DAY, 1996–2002

“The National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Association (Australia) Incorporated”

The association of Malaya and Borneo veterans in Australia was originally affiliated with the National Malaya & Borneo Veterans Association in the United Kingdom (NMBVA). The South Australian sub-branch (1995-97) had Raymond (Dick) Villiers as Chairman, John Murray as Secretary, and Jim Deering as Treasurer.

On 29 February 1996, a uniquely Australian national association was established (as a Company with Directors), registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) under the name “National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Association (Australia) Incorporated” (ABN 74 072 982 793).

Following the first national AGM, South Australian members gathered on Wednesday 31 June 1997 to form a state branch. Ross Ortmann served as President and Secretary from the establishment of the SA Branch in 1997 until his death on 19 May 2002, aged 66. Don Cameron served as Treasurer from 1997 to 2005.

It was under this title that South Australian members marched in Adelaide on Anzac Day in the years from 1997 to 2001, with State President Ross Ortmann as contingent commander.

ANZAC DAY, 2001
Adelaide, Wednesday 25 April 2001

On Anzac Day 2001, members of the SA Branch of the “National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Association (Australia) Incorporated” participated in the Adelaide Anzac March. State President Ross Ortmann was contingent commander, and his grandsons were Banner and National Flag Bearers.

The Executive Committee elected at the first Annual General Meeting on Saturday 17 July 2010 comprised Brian Selby (President), Don Cameron (Vice-President), Jenny Cameron (Treasurer) and Leonie Hughes (Secretary), with Committee members Allan Davies JP, Andrew Buckingham, Bob Nelmes and Deidre Nelmes. Among the foundation members were Mal 'Digger' Digance (left).

On Saturday 17 July 2010, a dinner was held to re-form the official NMBVAA Branch in South Australia, under the auspices of the national Association. Then, the first Annual General Meeting of the reformed SA/NT Branch was held at Hilton RSL on Wednesday 21 August 2010. The meeting was attended by 24 members, who enjoyed a light lunch provided by the Hilton RSL Ladies' Auxiliary. Brian Selby was elected as President of the reformed SA/NT Branch.

Ben and Elliott Ortmann are grandsons of Corporal Ross Ortmann (1935-2002), founding SA Branch President. Ross was a member of the 27 April 1954 National Service intake, and trained with 16 National Service Training Battalion at Woodside Army Camp. He served as a Private in the Royal Australian Infantry Corps, and saw overseas service with the 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment in South Korea after the Armistice (23 December 1955 to 4 March 1956) and with the 2nd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment during the Malayan Emergency (14 October 1956 to 30 October 1958).

Ross Ortmann (1935-2002) was President and Secretary from the establishment of the SA Branch in 1997 until his death on 19 May 2002, aged 66.

Anzac Day 2024 particularly marked the 25th anniversary of the first Australian Defence Force deployments to East Timor. East Timor veteran Warrant Officer Class 2 Nathan Price, Royal Australian Artillery carried the Australian National Flag ahead of the NMBVAA contingent. Nathan served two 6-month tours of duty in East Timor.

His first deployment was as a Bombardier from April to October 2001 with the Civil-Military Operations team attached to the 4RAR battalion group (AUSBATT) under the UN Transitional Administration in East Timor (UNTAET) Peace-Keeping Force (Operation 'Tanager'). As a Sergeant he deployed again in 2006-07 on Operation 'Astute', in a Civil-Military Operations role with the 6RAR ANZAC Battle Group.

ANZAC COMMEMORATIONS

25 April 2025

For the 2025 Anzac March in Adelaide, Vice-President Don Cameron led the NMBVAA contingent, with Warrant Officer Class 2 Nathan Price in uniform as the Australian National Flag bearer.

Oscar Johnsson. Marching with the contingent was Oscar Johnsson (pictured below). Oscar first saw operational service as a Regimental Signaller with 3RAR in the Federation of Malaya in 1957-59 during the Malayan Emergency. He then served on the Malay Peninsula in 1963-65, and as a Rifleman with 'C' Company, 3RAR at Serikin in Sarawak in 1965. This Australian War Memorial image (below left) is on display at the Army Museum at Keswick Barracks. It shows Private Johnson (centre) and Iban Tracker 'Lulut' on patrol near the Sarawak-Kalimantan border. This is believed to be Lulut anak Aloh from Kapit in eastern Sarawak.

John Boxer. In the image of Oscar, in the background, is John Boxer who served overseas with 'A' Battery of the Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery. The battery was attached to the 28th Commonwealth Infantry Brigade at Terendak Camp on the Malay Peninsula, from October 1965 to September 1967, on security and patrolling duties. John is pictured here with his daughter Michelle and grand-daughter Nakita.

ANZAC COMMEMORATIONS **24-25 April 2026**

On Anzac Day 2026 we marked the 111th anniversary of the Gallipoli landings, and also honoured all who lost their lives in wars, operational campaigns, peace-keeping missions and humanitarian relief operations.

Adelaide has the distinction of having erected the first monument in Australia to recognise service during World War 1. The 'Wattle Grove WWI War Memorial' was dedicated by the Governor-General on 7 September 1915.

Uniquely, it was dedicated to 'Australasians', including New Zealanders, whereas most memorials which were erected during or after the war were dedicated to Australians or local men who served and/or died.

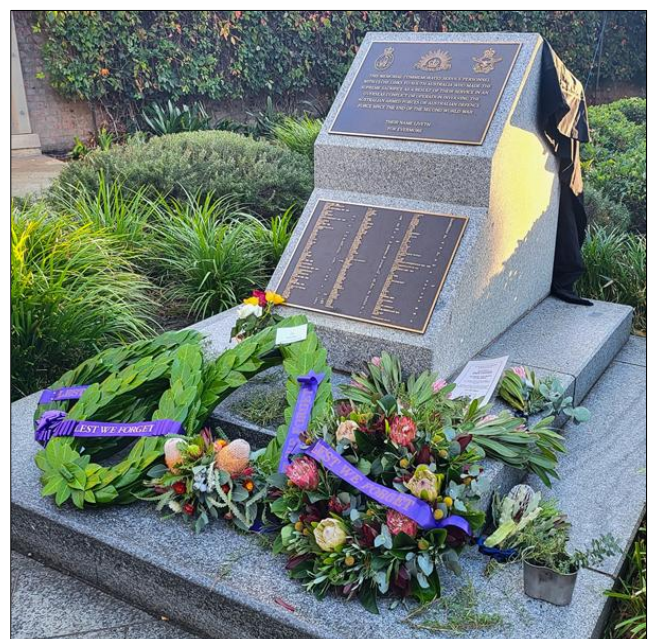
This Dardanelles Memorial, which commemorates the landing of Australasian (Australian and New Zealand) soldiers on the Gallipoli Peninsula on 25 April 1915, was relocated to Lundie Gardens in October 1940, and then to the Anzac Centenary Memorial Walk on Kintore Avenue where it was re-dedicated on 11 November 2018.

The South Australian National War Memorial, honouring the fallen of World War 1, comprises a frame for two emotive scenes, showing the prelude and the epilogue to war; bronze tablets lining the walls of an inner crypt bear the names of South Australians who died during the Great War.

Behind the memorial is the World War 2 Wall of Remembrance, honouring those who enlisted in South Australia to serve their King and Country and who 'paid the supreme sacrifice'.

Also located behind the National War Memorial is the Post-WW2 Operations Memorial (below right), which commemorates Service personnel from or associated with South Australia who died in service or were killed while serving in conflicts since the end of World War 2, including 42960 Signalman John Tassell (1944-1966).

Approaching these memorials along Kintore Avenue from the Dardanelles Memorial is the emotive Anzac Commemorative Memorial Walk and Wall, commemorating the Service personnel of South Australia who have served in the various conflicts in which Australia has been involved since Federation.

ADELAIDE HIGH SCHOOL Peace Garden and Honour Boards Project

We have previously reported on Adelaide High School's project to honour Old Scholar Service personnel, particularly several from the post-WW2 Malaya and Borneo campaigns. In October last year, Paul Rosenzweig attended the AHS Senior Years Speech Assembly to present an Order of Australia Association (SA Branch) Student Citizenship Award certificate and medallion to Head Prefect Ingrid Heinrich. Ingrid's 'Highly Commended' citation included reference to her, "*creation of an Adelaide High School Honour Board working with Old Scholars, and initiating the establishment of a Peace Garden*".

We have been pleased to be able to provide some research support to this project, which has been coordinated by teacher Amy Worswick, and this research in turn has generated new names to add to the rolls. Amy attended our 2025 Malaya & Borneo Veterans Day service on 29 August and placed a tribute during the service.

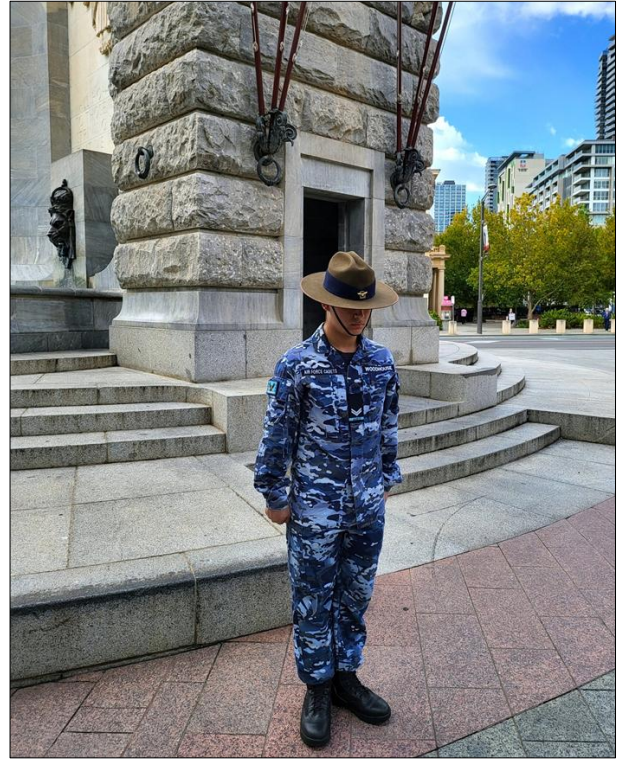

ANZAC VIGIL
Friday 24 April 2026

The Anzac Commemoration period began with the Anzac Eve Youth Vigil at the South Australian State War Memorial on North Terrace in Adelaide, sponsored by RSL-SA. The Vigil involves various youth groups who combine to form a Guard of Honour around the Memorial, from the evening of 24 April until the Memorial is handed over to the Dawn Service Catafalque Party just prior to dawn on 25 April. Air Force Cadets from 604 Squadron and from around 6 Wing participated in this Vigil and, after time to rest, many supported the Anzac March.

State President Paul Rosenzweig attended the Playford Youth Vigil at the Cross of Remembrance in Smithfield Memorial Gardens hosted by Mayor Glenn Docherty (see image below).





**DAWN SERVICE
Saturday 25 April 2026**

Our State President represented the NMBVAA at a Dawn Service hosted by Hilton RSL at the Cross of Sacrifice in the West Torrens War Memorial Gardens. The service was supported by the Caledonian Society Pipes & Drums, with No 601 Squadron, AAFIC providing the honour guard. He placed a tribute in memory of the fallen – notably recalling sacrifice during Confrontation (1962-1966), as this year we observe the 60th anniversary of the end of Confrontation which was brought to a close by the signing of the Malaysia-Indonesia Peace Agreement or ‘Jakarta Accord’ at Istana Merdeka in Jakarta, Indonesia on 11 August 1966. ANZAC MARCH Saturday 25 April 2026

On Anzac Day 2026 we marked the 111th anniversary of the Gallipoli landings, and also honoured all who lost their lives in wars, operational campaigns, peace-keeping missions and humanitarian relief operations. Our veterans and family members marched to honour the service and sacrifice of their comrades during the Malayan wars which followed World War 2, and also to honour all members of Commonwealth and Malaysian naval, military, air and police forces, including Iban Trackers, who served and lost their lives.

Our Vice-President, Confrontation veteran Don Cameron, again led the Malaya & Borneo veterans contingent.



Warrant Officer Class 2 Nathan Price carried the Australian National Flag at the head of our contingent to honour his father Dennis Price who had deployed on counter-terrorist operations on the Thai-Malay border in 1963-64.

One of the NMBVAA Banner Bearers was Ben Ortmann, a grandson of our first Branch President Ross Ortmann who had served in 1956-58 during the Malayan Emergency (Ben was assisted by Matt Kuta, obscured).



Vicki Crannaford carried the Malaysian National Flag in memory of her brother, Signalmán John Tassell, Royal Australian Corps of Signals (1944-1966).

John had served in Malaysia attached to the 208th Signals Squadron (Commonwealth), of the 28th Commonwealth Independent Infantry Brigade Group. John lost his life on the Malay Peninsula during Confrontation on 4 April 1966, aged 21.



The NMBVAA Banner bearers were Matt Kuta (right) and Ben Ortmann, a grandson of our first Branch President Ross Ortmann (1935-2002).

Ross completed National Service training in 1954, served in South Korea with 1RAR in 1955-56, and served during the Malayan Emergency with 2RAR in 1956-58, assigned to the 28th Commonwealth Independent Infantry Brigade Group at Minden Barracks on Penang Island.



Our Branch Chaplain Major Quentin Castle, Salvation Army, has supported our Branch events for the past 15 years.



State President Major Paul Rosenzweig OAM (ret'd) carried the Sarawak state flag to honour the eleven Australian Sarawak Defenders who lost their lives during Confrontation, and to honour the service of the Iban Trackers and all Sarawakians in defence of their homeland.



Megan Cameron marched for the first time, supporting her grandfather Vice-President and Borneo veteran Don Cameron. Megan carried the Sabah state flag – five Australians died in northern Borneo on operational service in defence of Sabah during the period of Confrontation.

BOMBARDIER JOHN DAVID BOXER

Confrontation-era veteran John Boxer joined us again for the 2026 Anzac March, accompanied by his daughter Michelle and grand-daughter Tiana.

John enlisted in the Australian Regular Army in South Australia on 9 October 1962. When the Regular Army had been established on 30 September 1947, a new numbering system was introduced to replace the wartime numbering system previously used in the Second Australian Imperial Force and its successor, the Interim Army. In the new ARA numbering system, the initial number designated the army military district of enlistment, separated from the army number itself by an oblique stroke. This oblique stroke in Army service numbers was discontinued in 1961. John was given the Service number '43041' – the numeric prefix '4' indicates an enlistment in South Australia, the army's 4th Military District (4MD), and the lack of oblique stroke indicates an enlistment after 1961.

John served on security and patrolling duties on the Malay Peninsula in 1965-67, after the deployed artillery battery completed its tour of duty on Borneo. He was honourably discharged in 1968.

The Australian Active Service Medal 1945-75 was approved in 1997 to recognise those who rendered service in warlike operations between 3 September 1945 and 13 February 1975. The clasp 'MALAYSIA' was awarded for Defence Force activities on the Malay Peninsula during the period from 17 August 1964 to 11 August 1966. John served with 'A' Battery, Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery attached to the 28th Commonwealth Infantry Brigade at Terendak Camp, from October 1965 to September 1967.

The Australian Service Medal 1945-75 was created in 1997, for service in, or in connection with declared non-warlike operations between 3 September 1945 and 16 September 1975. The clasp 'SE ASIA' was awarded for service on land in Malaysia between 1 August 1960 and 16 August 1964, and 12 August 1966 and 14 March 1975.

On 3 March 2004, the Malaysian Government established the *Pingat Jasa Malaysia*, acknowledging Australia's contribution during Confrontation between 31 August 1957 and 31 December 1966.

Finally, he was awarded the Australian Defence Medal which was established on 20 March 2006.



Ian Smith from Aboriginal Veterans SA has provided an image from a self-published book by Sergeant Larry D'Arcy, which shows Larry and John Boxer sitting on a field gun in Malaya – this is a 105 mm L5 Pack Howitzer.

This image was taken during an 'A' Battery, RAA range practice on the Malay Peninsula.

Standing is Bombardier Peter Prewett, who ended up RSM of the Army. He had earlier served with 102 Battery on Borneo, firing missions in support of Gurkha patrols.



**KUALA LUMPUR
DAWN SERVICE
25 April 2025**

The Australian High Commissioner in Kuala Lumpur Her Excellency Ms Danielle Heinecke joined with the New Zealand High Commissioner Mr Michael Walsh, Malaysians and members of the international community for a Dawn Service to commemorate 111 years of the Anzac Spirit.

Her Excellency was accompanied by the Australian Defence Advisor to Malaysia, Group Captain Belinda Edmunds.

The High Commissioner spoke of enduring Australia-Malaysia defence and security ties and said, *“the legacy of those who served here is not only written in history, it is carried forward in the strength of our relationships”*.

The Service was a meaningful moment of remembrance, reflection and shared respect between our nations.

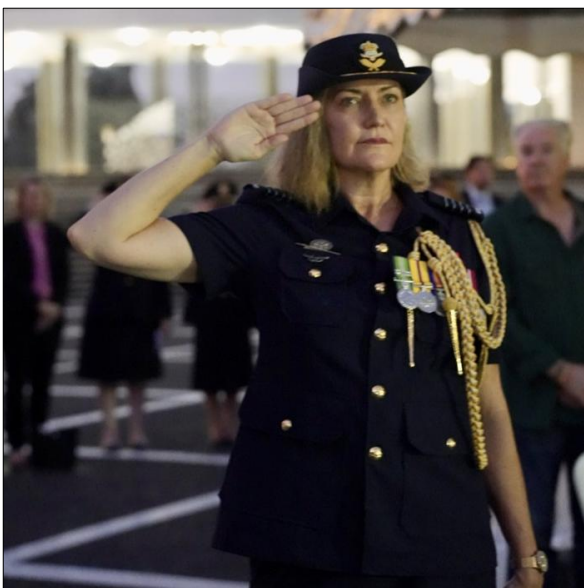

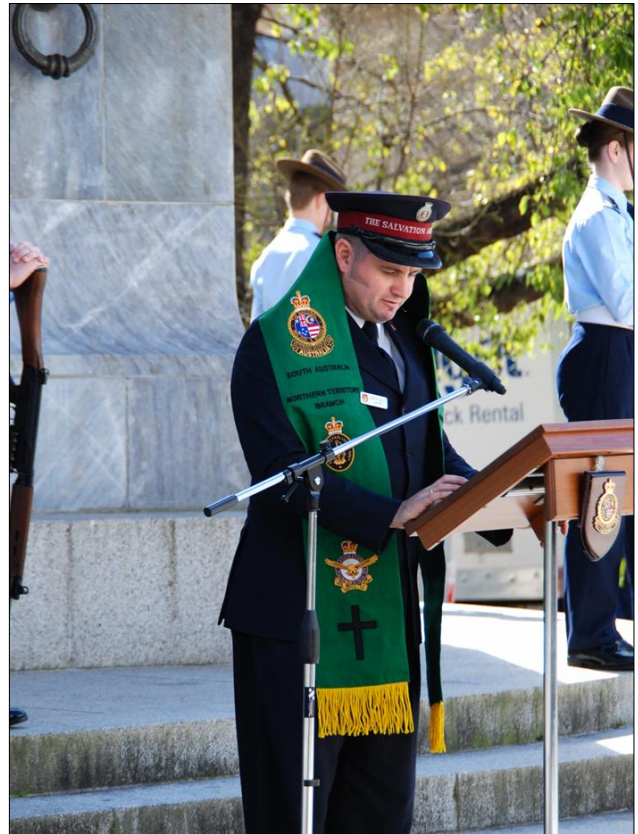
The first acknowledged his support of our special Malayan Emergency 75th anniversary commemoration on 31 May 2025.

CERTIFICATES OF APPRECIATION

On Anzac Day, Paul Rosenzweig and Don Cameron presented special Certificates of Appreciation to Ben Ortmann, Elliot Ortmann and Matt Kuta. These certificates acknowledged their many years' service supporting the SA/NT Branch as Banner Bearers in the annual Adelaide Anzac March, since at least 2001 when we first marched behind our new association banner.

Ben and Elliot are grandsons of our founding President former Corporal David Ross Ortmann (1935-2002).

Born in Mitcham on 1 June 1935, Ross completed National Service training in 1954 with 16 National Service Training Battalion at Woodside Barracks. He served in South Korea after the Armistice as a Rifleman with 1RAR in 1955-56, and then during the Malayan Emergency with 2RAR in 1956-58, assigned to the 28th Commonwealth Independent Infantry Brigade Group at Minden Barracks on Penang Island.

Ross was the founding President of the SA Branch of the NMBVAA when it was established in Australia in 1995, and continued to serve as President until his death in Adelaide on 19 May 2002, aged 66.
